## Down by the Station

During opening hours, the historic CNR Station welcomed 13,000 visitors in the 2019 season. This is an increase of 3,000 over last year. Our **CNR volunteers** not only made it possible for the site to remain open, but also engaged with visitors—talking about railway history, punching train tickets, and stamping young'uns hands and tickets with our new steam engine stamps.

Visitors during September and October thoroughly enjoyed watching the Saturday performance, *Wheels of Time*. With four shows a day, and 30 to 40 seats available, there was a **minimum of 120 people per day** in the audience.

Sometimes there were more, like on our last day. The 3pm show alone had 96 people in the audience!

Thanks again to Mark Forsythe (script writer), Tom Hammel (musical score creator), the community actors, and Creative Compass Society for directing the Langley Heritage Society production. Bravo all!

CNR Station Manager Helen Williams and long time model railway volunteer Gerry Landsman have been working with Lyle to develop a series of new murals that will be to the same scale as the model railway.

More inside improvements include reupholstering the cupola seats and restoring tongue and groove walls.

# Moir House Outbuildings Provide Cats With Safe Haven

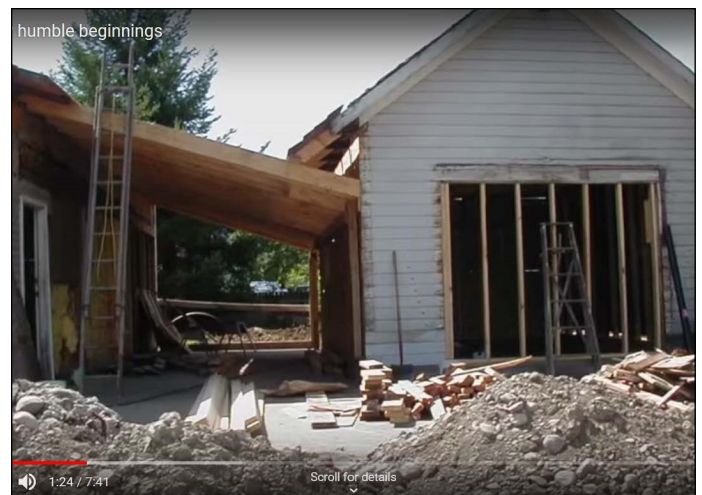
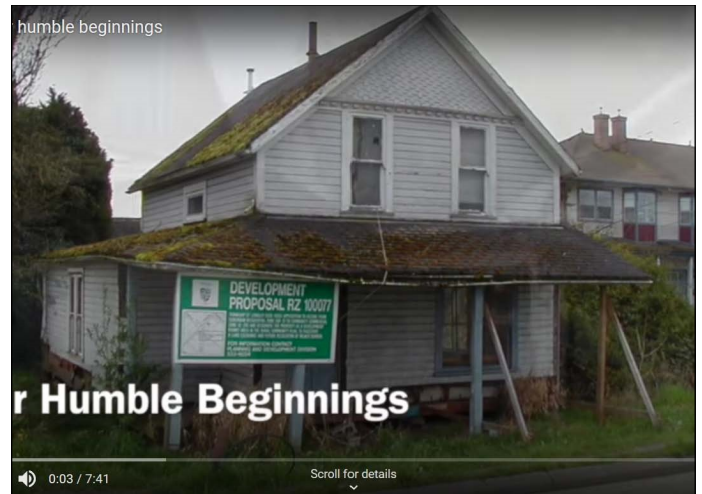
Scottish blacksmith George Robert Moir and wife Christian operated the Milner Blacksmith near their family house.

The old board and batten shop is long gone, but the family home built in 1909 survived along with many of George's tools which are in full operation at the BC Farm Museum.

In 2003, Township asked the Langley Heritage Society to restore the dilapidated Moir residence, and to create a permanent space from the existing outbuildings for the **Canadian Animal Rescue and Extended Shelter (CARES)**.

The construction was funded by the society and on December 13, 2003, CARES moved into the new shelter renovated to fit their needs thanks to Fred Pepin and his crew.

CARES is a **no-kill cat shelter** that rescues, shelters, and finds homes for stray, abandoned, and unwanted cats in Langley. Established in 1998, this year CARES celebrates 25 years of providing a safe haven for homeless cats in the Langley community. Over 7,000 cats have been adopted and given a second chance.

## Juniata, Saskatchewan (©1942-43)

This is the first station I have clear memories of living in, partly because I began school there, and partly because it was the start of a nefarious career for my little brother of getting into trouble and, unfortunately for him, always getting caught. Such a small town it was; station, one farm and a store.

One evening my curious brother slipped into the office and pulled the wires out of the open battery which was under the desk. It powered the dispatcher's phone - a very vital communication indeed. (There was no electricity in small towns then.)

The dispatcher was responsible for seeing that troop trains and supplies were on time and on track. About an hour and a half later, a freight train stopped and a CNR inspector got off to do a little investigating as to why the dispatcher's phone was out of service on the main line during wartime. The inspector made some very pointed comments about keeping that child behind the office door, but after a good cup of tea and a piece of mom's apple pie, didn't give dad any brownie points. As for my brother, it was the beginning of many more misdemeanors, not the end!
